Troop Money Earning Fast Fundamentals



Overview

An activity organized by a group (which can include troop, service unit, or group of registered girls, not council) that is planned and carried out by girls (in partnership with adults) to earn money for a troop/group trip, activity, or event. Groups can earn money in two distinct ways: Product Program and Money-Earning Projects.

Product Program Troop/Group Money-Earning Projects Activities organized by the group (not by the Girls can participate in two council-sponsored product sale programs each year: The Girl Council) that are planned and carried out by girls Scout Cookie Program and the Fall Product (in partnership with adults) and that earn money Program. All girl members, including Girl Scout for the group as a whole. Daisies and Juliette's (individually registered members), are eligible to participate in councilsponsored product-sales programs with volunteer supervision. Please remember that volunteers and Girl Scout Council staff do not sell cookies and other products—girls do.

A troop's primary money-earning activity should be the Girl Scout Cookie Program (however it is not a requirement). Any troop/group money-earning projects cannot take place during council-sponsored product programs (Fall Product Program and Cookie Program). Troop money-earning projects need written approval from GSWO Community Development Manager before you begin planning.

Pearl of Wisdom

Did you know: Troops and service units may receive a donation from any one individual or organization for no more than \$250 during the membership year (single donation or cumulative).





Activity 1: Troop Money Earning Budget

Instructions:

Divide into even groups.

Give each group a scenario. Using the scenario create a budget based on what you expect to spend on supplies and how you will use the remainder of your funds with your troop. Use google search to estimate cost of supplies. Provide each group a copy of the Program Event Guide to determine an activity that there troop can do based on their budget.

- Spaghetti dinner- They charge \$10 dollars per person. Your goal is to serve 100 people.
- Pet wash- They charge \$15 per pet. Your goals is to serve 30 pets.
- Bake sale- They charge \$3 per item. The goal is to sell 200 items.
- Craft bazaar- They charge \$5 per craft. The goal is to sell 75 crafts.



The troop/group funds may not be distributed to individual girls or adults.						
_ Girls cannot participate in gan	Girls cannot participate in games of chance and/or product demonstration parties.					
Girls may not directly solicit funds (i.e. donations, sponsorships, grants or walk-a-thons) and should follow all policies pertaining to money-earning in the <i>Volunteer Essentials</i> .						
Girl Scout troops/groups are an extension of Girl Scouts of Western Ohio, including the organization's IRS not- for-profit status. All grants and donations must be carefully monitored to ensure that Girl Scouts of Western Ohio complies with all IRS guidelines.						
Girl Scout troops/groups may not, in most situations, solicit grants or donations from foundations corporations businesses, or agencies. An exception to the above guideline is made if Girl Scout volunteers work for companie offering small grants (up to \$1,000) for special projects and not-for-profit groups supported by their employees						
Prior permission must be obtained from the community development manager before adults are allowed to solicit donations on the behalf of a Girl Scout troop/group. The Girl Scout troop/group must submit this form along with a budget plan and budget for the proposed project.						
Reflection and evaluation is an important part of the troop/group money-earning process. Please be sure to incorporate this portion into your troops/groups money-earning projects. You can ask the girls questions like: What did you like/dislike? What did you learn through this process? What would you do differently next time? How is this experience going to help you and your troop/group?
